

FEBRUARY MEETING

Division 5 Membership Meeting Minutes

Feb 7, 2020

The February 7, 2020 membership meeting was called to order at 7:30 PM by Assistant Superintendent Bryan Persing at Hambden Town Hall. 18 members and 1 guest were present.

We welcomed guest Dave Burke of Concord. He models in G scale.

Railfest 2020 chairman Jim Wendorf provided an e-mail report on the show status. Tables are reserved at Sun Rental. College is all set...Wednesday table delivery, Thursday table set up/covering 2-6pm, Friday vendors unload 11am-7pm, Saturday & Sunday our show. Need help to pick up our gate stand, PC stands & wagons from our Sun Rental unit and returned Sunday after the show. Need help setting up signs, unloading vendors, security, etc. About 50 tables remaining to be sold – opening to new returning vendors this week and then new vendors after checking the PO Box this weekend. Nine vendor cancellations. Eight vendors on waiting list. Eighty-one vendors to date (normally 100-110 with sell out). Advertising has been ordered, cut back from last year, still no Lake County Visitor Bureau Grant to date. Lakeland is offering Box Lunches (must pre-order). Railfest dinner at the Depot.

The Nominating Committee did not have any additional nominations to submit. We currently have Mike Carovac running for Assistant Superintendent. We are checking to see if Mike Buehner is running again as Superintendent.

It was reported that there will be a T-Trak module construction clinic (make and take) at the MCR regional convention at the end of May. This will include everything from building the basic module frame, installing track, wiring, and adding scenery. You will be able to put your finished module in the convention T-Trak layout after the clinic.

Dave Neff has started refreshing the MCR Clinician Database. He is looking for submissions from our Division members who have put on clinics at the meetings.

Webmaster Wayne Lette reviewed the operation and features of the new Members Only section of our Division 5 website. Everyone is encouraged to sign-in and add any information they are willing to share about themselves (phone number, address, e-mail address, areas you are willing to help others with). The information on this section of the website is only available to Division 5 members.

Reviewed upcoming shows and events. New York Central Historical Society 50th anniversary convention. Cleveland Ohio. May 15th -17th. Includes tours of Collinwood shops all 3 days and bus tour to Conneaut train station and museum and then Northeast Pa train station and museum. Also, Central Ohio prototype modelers meet at Marion station April 30th - May 1st. Marion station has many great train exhibits and also train watching from Marion tower. There will be a B&O Historical Society mini-convention in Burton, OH on Saturday, May 16, 2020.

There have been a couple of opportunities recently when it would have been nice to have a Division 5 business card to give to someone interested in the Division. Matt Kross will work up a new design and get some printed.

MINUTES

Railfest 2020 preparations: 1) Security – we will no longer require Lakeland Community College to provide a physical officer to be present at the Athletic Facility overnight. All the rooms are locked, the facility is closed at night, and the college has about a dozen cameras maintaining surveillance 24/7. This will save us about \$1200. 2) Laketran - We are now contracting directly with Laketran for our shuttle bus. Still need to verify pricing. 3) Contract - The contract is still being finalized by Lakeland, hopefully by the end of the week, no handball courts. 4) Lu Ann Burger would like a table to sell Harley's trains. She will use one of the Division 5 tables. 5) Setup times - Thursday - 2pm to 6pm (Sun Rental at 1pm to pick up supplies), Friday – 11am to 7pm, Saturday 7AM – 10AM then the show opens 10AM – 4PM, Sunday 8AM – 10AM then the show opens 10AM – 4PM, 4PM – 6PM to help the dealers get loaded – usually longer to 730pm. 6) Raffle - We will once again will be doing a raffle, items to be purchased from our vendor(s) Saturday morning. 7) Door prizes - Same as years past, request donation from vendors.

The BOD approved using the following Division 5 Company Store stock for door prizes at Railfest: N-scale reefers, HO railroad car kits remaining, Div 5 pins.

The BOD reviewed our Division grant procedures. There are some clarifications that we need to make. In addition, it was decided that any group requesting a Division grant must submit the request by the November BOD meeting. It is highly recommended that the grant requests be submitted earlier than that since, if there are any issues or questions, they can be resolved by the November BOD meeting. If there are open issues with a grant request as of the November BOD meeting, then the next time the request will be considered won't be until the following February BOD meeting. Funding requests may be submitted via e-mail but it is recommended that a representative of the group requesting the funds attend a BOD meeting to answer questions. It was decided that we need to create a Division 5 grant request form that lists the requirements and prompts for pertinent information. The main thing the form will emphasize is for the group to explain how this funding will promote model railroading. This form will be provided to a group when they request funding. Clerk Matt Kross will develop the form.

Funding request from the Painesville Railroad Museum for \$500 was approved to begin the process of building an "engine house" to store/display two large acquisitions: 1.) American Type 4-4-0, 7" gauge live steam locomotive with tender, flat car and caboose; 2.) reproduction of the NYC Empire Express 999 locomotive that was built at Collinwood Yard in 1941 to be used in parades.

Candidate Bio - Matt Kross Running for the office of Superintendent



Growing up, my older brother was the one that had the Lionel O trains. The trains were only set up around Thanksgiving and taken down in early January. But, they were set up in the basement on larger

and larger platforms each year. I loved watching them and running them when my brother would let me. My grandfather also put up a Lionel train under the Christmas tree that we were allowed to run. The big thing there was the operating milk car where the man in the car would throw out a milk can on the platform.

When I was six years old, my parents got me a Lionel HO trainset for Christmas. With my brother off to college, I had more of the basement available and my train layout would grow every year. In junior high, I decided to leave my layout up year-round. I never asked my parents if that was ok but they never asked me to take it down, especially when they saw how much work I had put into it.

In high school, I saw N scale and decided to switch. I liked the better scenery to trains ratio and the ability to put more in the same space. I was hooked on N and have never looked back. I am still in N to this day.

Like many of us, I had a lull in my model rail-roading in my mid-20's and early 30's. After getting married and buying a house that had a basement, I got back into railroading again. I built a 12' by 10' L-shaped layout but it never was quite what I wanted. I loved the N-Trak modules I saw at the local train shows and in 1990 decided to join LENS and build

some modules. I learned a lot from building the modules and working with the other club members. After about 20 years in my current house, I decided to finish off the basement and build my dream layout. In 2003 I started on what is my current layout. It is still very much under construction but is gradually getting more and more items completed.

I love trains and creating miniature scenes. I love doing scenery, structures, electronics, and animation. As an electrical engineer by profession, I have the ability to design custom electronics/software and I have lots of ideas I would like to try. I am going to retire in April 2020 and I am looking forward to spending a lot of time on my layout.

I have been a member of the NMRA since 1989 and became a Life member in 2001. I served as the Division 5 Trainwire Editor for 10 years and have been the Clerk for the last 12 years. Thus, I have been a member of the Division 5 Board of Directors for the last 22 years.

As Division 5 Superintendent, I would like to get more members to talk about what interests them and show us what they are working on. I feel our Bring 'n Brag time at meetings is the best part of the meeting. We get to see all sorts of interesting things, learn new ways of doing things, see old and new products, and hear about other people's modeling challenges. We obviously need to work on growing the Division membership, but that has always been a tough problem and I don't have any magic to throw at that problem at this time. I want us to continue to do all we can to promote model railroading. We need to keep Railfest going strong, not just because it is our main fund raiser, but because it is an important model railroading event in our community that the public enjoys coming to see. We all need to help with this event as much as we can.

BILLBOARD REEFERS

This month's bring n brag theme is 'billboard reefers'. No, you will not see Cheech and Chong puffing away on a roadside announcement (or will you?). Actually, in our model railroad world billboard reefers are the moving advertisements on iced box cars that were in operation until 1937 when the government disallowed their use (in most instances). Seems like the products they contained were getting free advertising throughout the country as the cars were freely interchanged between roads, and in many instances they actually hauled products very different from their original intent, particularly on back-hauls.

Various fruits and vegetables, meats, beers, soaps, and household products were among the most common products featured on these iced-refrigerator cars. Certain billboard-like cars persisted into the early 1960's that were exclusive haulers---Coors, Hamms beers; etc.

In our model railroad operations, anything from steam era up through the transition era well into the 50's would be fair game for an icehouse and a string of colorful reefers. Here are a few of the literally hundreds of billboard reefers available in many gauges. Most are replicas of actual prototypes.

NAPLES TRAIN MUSEUM AND DEPOT

During Christmas break Liz and I usually travel down to Florida to spend the holidays with the in-laws in Fort Myers. Now anytime we go somewhere and spend at least a few days I always look for anything that may be model train or railroad related. This past break I had heard about the Naples Train Museum & Railroad Depot so I asked if anyone would mind driving about 45 minutes south to check it out. I knew going in Liz (she enjoys these trips) and her Father (who worked on the DT&I Railroad in his younger days) wouldn't take much convincing.

The grounds, which are surrounded by million dollar con-

dos and sits on some prime real estate, are divided into a couple of different areas. The front of the building is the restored Naples Depot. They have many exhibits from the Naples area, including many railroad displays. It is all very well showcased and the best part this area is completely free to the public.

The back half of the building is where the model trains are kept and operated. For \$7 dollars you have access to the rather large 3 rail O gauge layout with many operating accessories. Most of these are push button so the kids that are there can operate all of them over and over and over. They also have many trains in cases that have been donated to the Train Museum over the years. Also included in the \$7

admission is a twice around the property ride on their 7.5 gauge train; unfortunately for us the owner of the steam engine was on vacation so we had the diesel pulling us that day. We finished up our day with a tour of a passenger car and caboose that they have on the property.

Trains and Motorcycling

There is a black and white photograph of me at 4 or 5 years old. I'm on the floor watching my American Flyer locomotive circling the Christmas tree. That's quite typical, but then it got real. As a kid we would go to my mom's uncle's house in Pennsylvania. Nearly every time we were there I saw Pennsylvania Railroad F-units idling across the street. But it was more than that. Although the house was close to the street, there were six steps from their front porch UP to the street. The tracks were only 50 feet from the street and then up another ten feet higher than the street. It seemed that every time we were there, a locomotive was parked there. I would look up in awe at the HUGE diesel locomotives. Needless to say I had never been this close to an idling diesel. Some evenings I would stare at the dim headlight and the numbers on the nose. Strangely enough, I never saw any trains in motion there. This was truly bigger than life; with that said, I should be modeling the Pennsylvania Railroad, right? (It never happened.)

I became aware of the Burlington Northern Railroad while riding my Harley to the West Coast in 1993. Just before crossing the Idaho- Montana boarder, I saw the first train since

leaving Ohio. In five days I don't remember seeing any trains. Tracks, yes. Trains in motion, no. So here I was cruising downhill on I-90 and across this valley was this train WORKING its way uphill. I was so impressed with that view. Six! Six Cascade green locomotives ...and I never did see the end of the train. I was hooked; my life had changed. Then and there I became a railfan and Burlington Northern became the road I would model.

My 1994 Colorado vacation came from the words of an early 1970s John Sebastian record. (Ask me sometime and I'll sing a verse for you.) I wanted to go to one of the places he was singing about. Red Wing, Colorado could have been a made-up name but one day I found it on a large map of the state. During a break, my co-worker just so happened to step in as I found it. Bubba (everyone should have a friend named Bubba!)...Bubba looked over my shoulder as I pointed to the little town and asked him if he wanted to ride out to Colorado. And just like that, the plans for the vacation started. Bubba had a Honda Goldwing and was a "train person". The only problem was that fifty miles was a LONG ride for Bubba. I had my work cut out for myself if we were going cover three thousand miles in three weeks! In Denver we met up with three other bikers (friends of

Bubba) who became our tour guides for a few days. Unfortunately they were not into trains. Two of the guys headed back to Denver after the weekend was over. The last guy showed us a few of his favorite places then two days later he was returning to his home and to work. He gave us a vote of confidence when he said that he'd been watching us and we were ready to tackle Colorado roads by ourselves now. A few days later Bubba and I were aboard the Durango-Silverton narrow-gauge train. The 45 + mile trip takes about 3 1/2 hours each way. I enjoyed wandering around the town of Silverton. If you ever get the chance, this is one train should ride. you



The next day we were beginning the return to Ohio. We stopped in Chama, New Mexico and were invited to come in and see the Cumbres and Toltec Scenic railroad engine repair facilities. We actually expected to be chased away. We got a short tour. They were very proud of their locomotives. I never saw a locomotive with its drivers

removed nor the inside of the boiler. From there we rode up to Cumbres Pass, Colorado 10,022 (elevation feet). We looked around, nothing was happening and we rode off. A few miles beyond the pass we saw the train returning from Alamosa,CO heading back to Chama. A guick U-turn and we were back at the pass to see the locomotive taking on water. I was able to get a few photos. I have to say that walking fast at that altitude, you run out of oxygen quickly. Sadly, the rest of the trip home was void of trains.


In 1998 there was a family reunion in Yosemite, California and I was going. There was no question about that. I've wanted to ride back to California where I was stationed in the Air Force in the mid-1970s. For years I planned the trip but every year the people that planned to ride would back out. Not this time. I planned a solo ride. Looking in the mirror I would see the total tour committee. ME! But then two weeks before my vacation, my Harley crapped out. I could have taken it back to the dealer who just rebuilt the engine but I needed something I could trust. Fortunately I was in-between wives at that time and had money. :) I bought a BMW motorcy-

This time because I was riding alone, I had added in time to see the railroad places that I

wanted to visit. Once again I saw the Durango-Silverton train up at Silverton, Colorado.



I made a special side trip to see the East portal of the Moffett Tunnel and I was thankful that I had a motorcycle with lots of ground clearance. I was dodging boulders imbedded in the dirt road that would have ripped the oil pan on my truck!



I also visited the Colorado Railroad Museum. I had a very cold ride through the Rocky Mountain National Park with roads plowed that left a wall of snow fifteen-foot tall.

My journey allowed me to see the Grand Canyon, to ride



over the Golden Gate Bridge and see the California RR museum in Sacramento. The family reunion was great too. On the return to Ohio, I was once again in Colorado. I rode through the nearly two mile long Eisenhower Memorial Tunnel on I-70 (which was like the world's longest walk-in freezer!). I was looking for a place to warm up. Not too far after exiting the tunnel I saw a sign for Georgetown Loop Railroad. I stopped and got a cup of coffee (A hot coffee cup never felt so good in my hands!). After I warmed up, I saddled up again and followed part of the dirt road to watch the train climb the famous Georgetown


