BOD Meeting 8 June 2020

A virtual Division 5 BOD meeting was held on June 8, 2020 via online meeting using Zoom. In attendance were Matt Kross, Mike Carovac, Bryan Persing, Bonnie Lette, Wayne Lette, Chuck Limbert, Ray Newnes, Bob Gittinger, and Linda Kacprzak.

- The Board discussed whether to proceed with holding the Division 5 picnic in July at the Painesville Depot. The Depot is now open and compliant with the current Ohio Covid-19 rules. It was decided to push back the picnic until August and check with the membership to see how many, if any, would attend if we have it. If there is not enough interest this year due to Covid-19 virus fears, we will cancel it completely. Also, if we go ahead with the picnic, we may not have a good count of how many people would attend, so it may be better to go with packaged snacks and drinks instead of trying to provide a meal.
- Bill Osborne is putting on an alternative activity in July. Bill will host one of his outdoor movie nights at his house. This will not be a Division sponsored event but we will advertise event to our membership to give them a train-related activity they can attend. Details will be in the July Trainwire.
- For the August 7th Division 5 membership meeting, we will once again meet outside at Bill Osborne's home in Leroy Township, Ohio for a brief business meeting and then an outdoor train movie night. Details will be in the July Trainwire. Pizza, packaged snacks, and soft drinks will be provided. Attendees will be encouraged to maintain physical distancing and wear masks.
- Our first in-person Division 5 meeting will potentially be the September 4th membership meeting at Hambden Town Hall. This physical meeting will depend on what the Ohio guidelines are at the time for club meetings with attendance under 40 people and also on whether Hambden Township will allow us to use the hall. If we do hold this meeting, those attending will be required to wear masks and maintain proper distancing. We will also try to broadcast this meeting via Zoom so those members who are not comfortable attending can still see what's going on.

Once physical in-person Division meetings are resumed, we are going to make a few changes to the refreshments. This doesn't have anything to do with the current virus situation but instead a way to make it easier for the members providing the refreshments. We are going to get rid of the large coffee pot and switch to using a "Mr. Coffee" style 12-cup coffee maker. This will make clean-up easier and reduce the amount of coffee that is thrown out after each meeting. We are also going to reduce the amount of water and soft drinks that are available. We are currently bringing three coolers to a meeting and only a few items from each cooler are used. We are going to go down to just one cooler. Again, this will reduce what needs to be hauled to the meeting and make clean-up after the meeting easier. We will also explore offering alternative

snacks. This will be left up to the refreshment coordinators.

- A draft of the Division 5 Grant Request Form was reviewed by the Board. A number of changes were identified and the form will be revised.
- The Mid Central Region BOD met on May 29, 2020 via Zoom. Division 5 members Matt Kross and Mike Buehner attended. A brief summary of the MCR BOD meeting was provided to the Division 5 BOD. The main topic of discussion by the MCR BOD was how each division was handling the current lack of meetings and train shows. A number of Divisions have come up with useful ways of connecting with their membership using electronic media and online meetings.
- We need to get the signature authorities changed to be the new officers on the Division and Railfest bank accounts. We will try to get this taken care of on June 13, 2020.
- The next Div 5 BOD meeting will be on Monday, July 13, 2020, at 7:30pm online using Zoom. This will be a special BOD meeting to determine whether to hold the Division 5 picnic and review when to restart in-person meetings. (*Note: Normally, BOD meetings are held on even numbered months from February to October and then in November and not in December.*)

We will have a program which will be viewable by those people virtually attending the meeting online.


Refreshments may be limited or non-existent depending on the ability of the refreshment coordinators being able to attend the meeting.

The Nightmare – Track Cleaning

Recently I was doing some research on the best way to clean track so that when my layout comes to life I would be prepared to keep it clean. So, off to the internet and You Tube I went. This is when the nightmare began. It seemed that for every person who used a specific product or item, there was someone who was against using that product or item. The only thing that they all agreed on was that there is only two ways to clean track, the dry method or the wet method. I know that this sounds a little bit crazy and that the two can be combined but think about it, there are only two ways to clean track and they are the dry or wet method. The problem comes in when it is the product(s) that is/are going to be used and yes there is multiple ways to do both. If you want to know which one is better the answer would be - both. It just depends on you. So, let's dive into the nightmare!

Dry Method: The definition of using the dry method can be simply stated as not using a liquid. What you use in this application can vary as much as there are people in the hobby. So we are going to stick to the most "popular" items.

Abrasives – Abrasives are just that. They rub off the dirt and tarnish that restricts a good contact between the rails and the wheels of the locomotive. These items are cleaning erasers such as the Bright Boy, ROCO Rubber or the Peco Rail Cleaning Rubber. These items contain small flakes or clips of metal which when rubbed over the track removes the dirt and tarnish. Another item used is sandpaper. Although the grit of the sandpaper can vary from 400 to 1600 grit depending on whom you talked to, this method does the same the erasers. The next item is simply a piece of Masonite board which is the least aggressive on the rails. Again, used like an eraser. The last method used seems a little dangerous because of the damage it can do to the rails and that is using a small fine grit grinding wheel on a Dremel

tool, ya! Regardless of the item you use, these items have two major problems. First, they tend to leave a lot of dirt and grit on and in the track ballast which must be vacuumed up so your locomotive does not pick it up. Second, they leave scratches on the flat of the rail. These scratches can collect dirt and grime reducing the electrical connection. If you use an abrasive be ready to burnish (gleaming) the rails. This entails taking a stainless steel washer and rubbing it, with some force, over the rails to eliminate the scratches.

Non-Abrasives – Non-abrasives are items which do not scratch the rails. Items that were used in the mega amount of videos that I watch varied but the most common were micro cloths, jewelry cloths, felt pads, coarse upholstery material and Mr. Clean Magic Eraser. The major problem with these items is how fast they can become dirty which eliminates their cleaning capabilities. As most of these items can be cleaned, you may need to have a large stock on hand depending on how big your layout is and how much of it you plan to clean at one time.

Although the dry method is very effective if done right, it does have its drawbacks. The dry method is very labor intensive and time consuming. In one of the videos I watched as a guy stated that it took him a full weekend and two evenings to do his layout. Even though there are products like the Woodland Scenics Tidy Track tool the dry method can make it hard to get into tight areas such as tunnels and bridges.

Wet Method: The definition of the wet method is just that, use a liquid on some type of applicator and rub it on the rails. Once again there are probably hundreds of liquids that can be used but these tended to be the most common.

<u>WARNING</u>: The wet method usually entails using some form of chemical mixture. Proper ventilation, hand and eye protection should be used as the liquid and fumes could cause injury. (Continued....)

Solvents – Chemical solvents come in a large variety of different products which includes Acetone, Mineral Spirits, Lacquer Thinner, Lighter Fluid, Nail Polish Remover, and even Track Magic. Believe it or not these were some of the most common solvents used. Even though these items do an excellent job of cleaning the rails of dirt, grime, and tarnish care must be taken when using these items as these items are very flammable. Another problem with solvents is that if they are allowed to puddle they can and will melt the plastic ties causing a warping of the track. This is especially common around turnouts where cleaning become a little more difficult. The main reason given for their use was the fact that they evaporate quickly. Another thing about solvents is that their chemical makeup tends to allow them to attract dust and dirt (an oxymoron). The two most common used was Acetone and Nail Polish Remover. Most nail polish removers contain Acetone just in a smaller amount.

Isopropyl Alcohol – Probably the most commonly used cleaner but, it is also the one cleaner that comes under attack the most. The main reason is that it too has a chemical composition that allows it to attract dirt and dust. The main reasons why this is the most commonly used cleaner is because it does the job at a cheap price. Most modelers use the 90% alcohol because it evaporates very quickly and is easy to apply to an applicator. Although over time it might discolor (bleach) some plastics, with care it can do the job. The only other problems with Isopropyl Alcohol are that it will dry out your skin and the fact that it is *flammable*.

Goo Gone – This one caught me of guard. I watched as someone on You Tube set a locomotive on a track and the locomotive would not move. Then he cleaned it with Goo Gone and the locomotive had no problems. The only thing that would get me concerned is the fact that Goo Gone tends to leave a residue and evaporates slowly. Also, Goo Gone is made with citrus and even though it smells like Oranges it is still a mild acid. I think I would use this maybe as an initial cleaner then follow it up with something else.

Vinegar – Vinegar has long been known as an excellent cleaner and can be found in many products on the open market but, like Goo Gone vinegar is a mild acid. It should be noted that apple cider vinegar is stronger than white or distilled vinegar. Now I am not going to bad mouth an item that turned a dull track into a shiny one. What I am going to say is that being an acid it just might slowly work on eating or pitting the track especially the brass tracks. The only other thing about using vinegar is that your track may smell like Italian dressing for a few days.

Window and Surface Cleaners – Most of these cleaners contain either vinegar or ammonia. They are excellent cleaners just in a diluted form. The main reason for modelers using these products is because of ease of use, price, and that it is easy to apply it to an applicator. I will say that the only thing that could cause problems is that these products contain a lot of water and dry fairly slowly.

WD-40 – Yes there are people out there cleaning their tracks with WD-40 and the reason why is as they say "it works". The one thing that I did pick up on was that using this product was not a clean and run scenario. Most of the people let their layout sit overnight before running their trains across the WD-40 cleaned tracks. The bad thing about WD-40 is that it is also a lubricant and could cause some traction issues depending on the type of wheels you are using.

Electrical Contact Cleaner – It seems now that the newer game in town is the use of electrical contact cleaner. There were several You Tube videos where the presenter laid out the case for use of contact cleaner. Of course the main one was that it was designed for cleaning electrical surfaces for improved electrical contact. The major problem is that almost all available cleaners only come **(Continued....)**

in aerosol cans and the propellant evaporates very quickly, which was pointed out in the videos. The only non-aerosol spray I could find was from CRC but, it may not be available anymore. Another problem is that not all contact cleaners are plastic safe. Just like glues read the label before applying to the track or at least test it on an old piece of track. Most cans will most likely say - "Safe on most plastics". From what I have found plastic safe contact cleaners (those designed for electronics) tend to be pricey. You will also need to watch out for those contact cleaners that contain lubricates or are chlorinated. Depending on what you want, contact cleaners can range from \$6 to \$210 for a 16oz can. But fear not there is an electronic cleaner you can make at home for little of nothing. Simply make a simple 1:1 mixture of distilled water and isopropyl alcohol or vinegar - really, really. You would think that these You Tube presenters would know about this because they are the ones that are saying to never use isopropyl alcohol.

Manufactured Track Cleaners – There are several manufactures of track cleaners on the open market. One of the problems with these items is price. For one manufacture a 1.8oz bottle of track cleaner will cost you \$6.99. Another manufacture will charge you \$31.98 for an 8.5oz bottle so, buyer beware.

Some of the brands out there are Tidy Track from Woodland Scenic, Track and Rail Cleaner ACT-6006 from Aero-Car Hobby, Zap Rail-Zip 2 and Rail & Road Track Cleaner from Blue Rail Hobbies. If anyone has used any of these products let me know how they worked.

Once again if the wet method is done right then you should have excellent results but, like the dry method it is time consuming but not as labor intensive. The wet method also has the same problem as the dry methods were as it may be difficult to get into some areas. One thing that is for sure is that you will need a lot of applicators.

Of all the You Tube videos I watched and of all the research I have done one thing stands out when it comes to keeping your track clean, get rid of those plastic wheels on your rolling stock. I think the method I will be using will be a combination of both – the dry and wet method. The only difference is that I think I will invest in some track cleaning cars. For now we will postpone the research I did on these until a later time as this has became another project. I hope you all are well and enjoying life. Hope to see you soon!

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
